<b>Judging</b>	Premiums and ribbons are given to those who receive 1 <sup>st</sup> , 2 <sup>nd</sup> , and 3 <sup>rd</sup> place. See fair schedule for date and times. Exhibitors are not allowed in the Pavilion until judging is completed. Animal entries must be handled and shown by the registered exhibitor only. Exhibitor may only bring one animal at a time to the judging area (unless judge requests more). No pen judging.	All entries qualify for A, B, or C ribbon. # MANISTEE COUNTY AGRICULTURE SOCIETY BY-LAWS

## Article I - Name

The name of this organization shall be known as the Manistee County Agricultural Society. A Non-Profit Michigan Corporation.

## Article II - Purpose of Society

The purpose of the Society shall be:

1. To manage the Manistee County Fairgrounds, Onekama, Michigan, and to oversee and encourage the use of the fairgrounds on year-round basis for wholesome entertainment and recreation.
2. The advancement and encouragement of agriculture, horticulture, and mechanical arts, household arts and science.
3. To promote 4-H Club work, F.F.A. activities and all other types of educational work.
4. To furnish wholesome entertainment, recreation, and amusement in connection with the Manistee County Fair.

## Article III - Directors

**Section 1.** The Society shall have seventeen (17) Directors. Five (5) to be elected each year for a three (3) year term by the Membership of the Society and approved by the Manistee County Board of Commissioners. The Board of Commissioners shall appoint one (1) member for a one (1) year term. One (1) member shall be appointed by the Board of Directors of the Society for a one (1) year term to serve as Secretary-Treasurer on the Board. All Directors shall have reached their nineteenth (19<sup>th</sup>) birthday.

**Section 2.** The society shall have one (1) junior director term of three (3) years. This director shall have reached and be elected during their sixteenth (16<sup>th</sup>) birthday.

**Section 3.** The directors shall hold a meeting at the adjournment of the Annual Meeting of the members and proceed to the transaction of such business, as they deem advisable.

**Section 4.** If a vacancy is caused in the Board of Directors, the Board of Directors shall fill said vacancy.

## Article IV - Officers

**Section 1.** The officers of the Society shall be President, Vice President and Secretary-Treasurer. The President shall be elected by the members at the annual meeting of the Society, or at the adjournment meeting thereof, and serve for a period of three (3) years.

The Vice-President shall be elected by the Directors from among their own members, and shall serve until a successor is elected and qualified.

The Secretary-Treasurer shall be appointed by the Board of Directors and serve as a Director for a period of one (1) year. The Secretary-Treasurer shall be appointed by the Board of Directors at their annual meeting,

The President, Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer shall be members of the Board of Directors.

**Section 2.** The President shall preside at all the meetings of the Society. In the case of his/her absence it shall be the duty of the Vice-President to preside at the meeting.

In the absence of both the President and Vice-President, the meeting shall select its chairman.

**Section 3.** It shall be the duty of the Secretary to be present at the meetings of the Society and the Board of Directors and to keep an accurate record of the proceedings and to perform such duties as are required of him/her. It shall be his/her special duty to preserve all books, papers and records of the Society.

**Section 4.** It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all the monies of the Society and disburse the same on orders approved by the various Directors and signed by the President. He/she shall render a report of the receipts and expenditures at the Annual Meeting and at other times when required.

**Section 5.** Each director serves on a volunteer basis and is not personally liable to the Society or members for monetary damages for a breach of the Directors fiduciary duty; and that the Society assumes all liability to any person other than the Society, or its members for all acts or omissions of a volunteer or officer.

## Article V - Members

**Section 1.** Any person interested in this organization may participate in the Annual Meeting by having purchased a Season Membership Ticket.

## Article VI - Meetings

**Section 1.** The President and Secretary shall hold the Annual Meeting of the Society in November of each year at such hour and place and date as determined. Such notice shall be published in at least one local newspaper in the county.

**Section 2.** Special meetings of the Society may be ordered by the Board of Directors or upon the written request of twenty-five (25) members (or more) of the Society, filed with the Secretary, or upon the request of three (3) or more members of the Board. Whenever a meeting of the Board of Directors is called the members shall be notified of the meeting by the Secretary.

**Section 3.** Nine (9) or more said directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

## Article VII - Fairs

**Section 1.** The Board of Directors shall, as soon as possible, after the Annual Meeting, decide whether it is advisable to hold a fair or other exhibition to carry on the object of this Society.

**Section 2.** The Board of Directors shall determine at what place the Fair or Exhibition shall be held.

## Article VIII - Standing Committees

**Section 1.** The Executive Committee shall consist of the President, Vice-president and Secretary-Treasurer, who shall serve on this committee until the Annual Meeting or at which time a new Executive Committee shall be formed.

A list of the Executive Committee shall be made available to the Board of Directors.

**Section 2.** It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to have detailed charge of all matters pertaining to active work of the Society and be responsible to the Board of Directors.

**Section 3.** At any Executive Committee meeting called, three (3) members shall constitute a quorum. Minutes of the Executive Committee meeting shall be incorporated and become part of the minutes of the next regular meeting of the Board of Directors.

**Section 4.** Standing Committees shall be appointed at the discretion of the Board of Directors and reports of it shall be Incorporated into the minutes of the next regular meeting of the Board of Directors.

The members of the committees are expected to exert their best efforts in the work of their committees and to attend meetings when called.

#### **Article IX**

The above by-laws shall supercede any previously on file anywhere in the State of Michigan, but may be altered or amended at any annual meeting of the Society on a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

The Directors, shall as of October, 1980, for the first year of the existence of this Society, be elected for a term of three (3) years and thereafter as each term of the Director expires, it shall be filled for a period of three (3) years or upon a vacancy, the Board of Directors shall appoint a person to fill the unexpired term of that director.

#### **Article X – Disposition of Property**

Should the Manistee County Agricultural Society be dissolved, all assets, real and personal property, will revert to the County of Manistee.

The Manistee County Fair originated in 1886 under the name of the Manistee County Agricultural Society and is still recognized as a non-profit Michigan Corporation.

The Manistee County Fairgrounds is owned by Manistee County and managed by the Board of Directors of the Manistee County Agricultural Society.

## **Rules & Regulations For Exhibits & Exhibitors**

### **SECTION 1. RULES FOR MERCHANTS AND MERCHANT RENTAL**

- A.** Merchants may not call attention to their displays in a noisy or disorderly manner.
- B.** Persons coming onto the grounds for the solicitation of funds, etc. must be in an established booth area. There will be no soliciting on grounds. Activities of the merchant or organization must be confined to the area that has been registered for and reserved in agreement with the Manistee County Agricultural Society (Fair Board).
- C.** Merchants must contain their exhibit/display to the area that has been registered for and reserved in agreement with the fair board.
- D.** Every precaution will be taken for the safe keeping of every article but the Fair Board will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur, and upon these conditions these entries will be accepted.

### **SECTION 2. RULES FOR EXHIBITORS**

**A.** Exhibitors: for "Open Class" and may come from anywhere in the State of Michigan and may enter items. In "4-H Class," departments 11, 17, and 18C are open to registered Manistee and Benzie county 4-H youth. All other departments are open to 4-H and non 4-H youth. Minimum age for exhibitors is 5 years old. However, in accordance with Mich. Dept. of Ag. Regulation 811, those showing animals in Open Class must be 6 years old by January 1, 2009, in order to receive premiums. **ALL EXHIBITORS** in "4-H Class" who are less than age 9 on January 1, 2009 are ineligible for premiums. Maximum age for "4-H Class" is no older than 19 on January 1, 2009. (Exceptions are participants no older than 26 years of age by January 1, 2009, who are eligible for special education services in their school district).

**B. REGISTER YOUR ENTRIES BY CIRCLING THE APPROPRIATE CLASS NUMBERS IN THE COLUMNS LOCATED AT THE BACK OF THIS BOOK.** Additional booklets are available at the fair office. To register your items, mail or deliver the entry form to: **Manistee County Fair, P.O. Box 398, Onekama, MI 49675. Forms must be received by 2:00 p.m., Saturday, August 29, 2009.** Call (231) 889-5566 for more information. All Entries may be brought to the fairground on **Monday, August 31, 2009 from 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.**

**C.** All exhibits not previously shown at the Manistee County Fair are eligible for entry (livestock are excluded from this rule).

**D.** In order for entries to be eligible for the fair, all exhibitors shall have recorded them on the proper entry forms by the registration deadline indicated for that department. All entries must be made according to the premium listing, as they will be judged accordingly. **The judges will rule out any article or animal not properly classified.**

**E.** The Fair Board reserves the right to refuse any entries offered, particularly those requiring an unreasonable amount of room. All allotment of space is determined by the Division Superintendent. Space needed for Department 9 - Group Exhibits must be arranged prior to entry day.

**F. Note:** Entries may be removed from the fairgrounds **Sunday, September 6, between 8:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. There are no exceptions without permission from the General Superintendent.** Earlier removal will incur forfeiture of any premium awarded.

**G.** All Livestock/Horses shall be removed from the fairgrounds no earlier than 6:00 a.m. on Sunday, September 6. Early removal may only occur with written permission of the Fair Board President or Barn Superintendent. Arrangements must be made in advance so that a 4-H Livestock Council or Horse Show Committee member is present at time of removal. Failure to follow this procedure will result in immediate forfeiture of all animal premiums awarded.

**H. ALL EXHIBITS MUST BE INSIDE ALL FAIR BUILDINGS BY 7:00 P.M. ON AUGUST 31, 2009.**

**I. Entry Day:** Exhibits in the Pavilion must be in place and exhibitors out of the building by 7:30 p.m. Exhibits in the barns must be weighed in/checked in by 7:00 p.m. on entry day. Exhibitors must leave the area once the Barn Superintendent and 4-H Livestock Council and Horse Show Committee have determined that all entries are securely in place.

**J.** All entries must be made in the name of the owner. No article or animal shall compete for more than one premium. **A person shall not enter more than one item under any one class number.**

**K.** Entries in "Open Class" are judged by the American judging system, which means that a 1st, 2nd, and 3rd placing are determined out of all the entries in a particular class. Entries in "4-H Class" are judged by the Danish judging system, which means that *all* entries in a particular class receive a premium and/or ribbon in the form of an A, B, or C placing.

**L.** All animal entries must be handled and shown by the registered exhibitor only. Exhibitor may only bring one entry at a time to the judging area (unless judge requests more). No pen judging.

**M.** The names of the exhibitors and class numbers of exhibits will be entered in the Fair Board secretary's records, and entry tags will be furnished on Entry Day.

**N.** Every precaution will be taken for the safe keeping of every article, but the Fair Board will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur, and upon these conditions the entries for exhibit are received.

**O.** All complaints must be in writing and accompanied by a fee of \$25.00. If complaint is determined to be legitimate, deposit will be refunded. Exhibitors have 10 days from close of fair to file complaints/protests with the Fair

Board, and 45 days from date of that complaint to file an appeal with the Michigan Dept. of Agriculture. The Fair Board will address complaints at their September meeting.

### **SECTION 3. GENERAL RULES FOR LIVESTOCK, POULTRY, GOATS, HORSES AND COMPANION ANIMALS, ETC.**

**A.** Housing for livestock and horses is at discretion of Superintendent. The Manistee County Fair Board reserves the right to limit quantities of Open Class animals. 4-H member entries take priority.

**B.** Superintendent will make decisions regarding removal of animals that pose a safety threat due to evidence of threatening behavior or lack of training. Any animal determined to be improperly or illegally medicated in any way, or artificially, fraudulently, or deceptively prepared or tampered with or misrepresented in any way before coming into the judging arena will be disqualified.

**C.** Each animal will be required to be placed on the grounds in the division to which it belongs.

**D.** Stalls are provided for livestock and horses, but when insufficient to accommodate the entries, the best possible provisions under the circumstances will be provided.

**E.** Entries will not be accepted after **June 30, 2009. ANY ITEM OR EXHIBIT IN OPEN OR IN 4-H CLASS MAY NOT COMPETE OR BE JUDGED IN BOTH OPEN AND 4-H CLASS. THERE WILL BE NO DOUBLE ENTRIES.**

**F.** All feed and bedding will be furnished by the exhibitor. Exhibitor will be responsible for the cleaning of stalls, pens, etc. Infractions of these rules will result in penalties. **DAILY PEN INSPECTIONS WILL BE CONDUCTED. A \$10 DAILY FEE WILL RESULT FOR ALL UNCLEAN PENS. A \$5 DAILY FEE WILL RESULT FOR MISSED FEEDINGS.**

**G.** Water **MUST** be available to livestock at all times.

**H.** The following species will **NOT** be allowed on the fairground for any reason unless they have been tested for the following and show **negative** results:

**Cats:** Current rab/dist/pneum vaccinations

**Dogs:** Current rabies/distemper vaccinations

**Horses:** Proof of negative Coggins

**Cattle:** Current RFID tag and proof of current PIN

**Sheep:** USDA Scrapie tags required

**Goats:** USDA Scrapie tags required, all goats must be dehorned

**Swine:** "Direct to Slaughter" rules may apply

**Poultry:** Entry Day Pullorum testing required

**All:** Proof of origin papers filed with fair registration

**I.** Minimum age to show any animal in Open Class is 5 years old by January 1, 2009. (See 2. A for premium info). 4-H youth ages 5 to 8 may show in 4-H Cloverbud classes or Open classes, but they are ineligible for premiums in 4-H classes and must not engage in any form of competition. **ALL YOUTH UNDER THE AGE OF 9 EXHIBITING ANIMALS WILL HAVE A PARENT OR DESIGNATED ADULT IN THE SHOW AREA WITH THEM AT ALL TIMES.**

**J.** In order for 4-H Horse Show exhibitors to receive premiums, ribbons, and trophies, they must complete a stall shift by keeping one of their show horses (used in the show) in the horse barn during fair week. This includes fulfilling a **Barn Duty** shift also. Horse exempt from this would require documented proof that the animal has a serious physical condition that would make this impossible.

### **SECTION 4. FEES**

#### **Livestock - Open Class Only – Pay at time of registration**

**A.** Rabbits and Poultry: 25¢ per animal - open class only.

**B.** Goats, Sheep and Swine: 50¢ per animal - open class only.

**C.** Cattle and Horses: \$1.00 per animal - open class only.

**D.** Pullorum test (for poultry): 25¢ per animal - open class only.

**Open Class exhibitors of Livestock must also complete a Pen & Stall form – available at the Extension office (889-4277). This must be submitted with fair registration.**

#### **Open Class Non-Animal Projects – Cancelled Entry Fee**

**A.** Dept. 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8: A maximum of 10 registered items may be dropped at no charge. For more than 10 items dropped, a \$3.00 "records maintenance fee" will be charged for every 1- 10 items dropped.

#### **4-H Non-Animal Projects – Cancelled Entry Fee**

**A.** Dept. 12, 13, 14, 15, and 16: A maximum of 10 registered items may be dropped at no charge. For more than 10 items dropped, a \$3.00 "records maintenance fee" will be charged for every 1- 10 items dropped.

### **SECTION 5. PREMIUMS**

**A.** The awarding of premiums shall be designated as follows:

**First** premium by blue ribbon, card or sticker

**Second** premium by red ribbon, card or sticker

**Third** premium by white ribbon, card or sticker

Judges will only award premiums on exhibits deemed worthy. Ribbons or rosettes will be awarded for all places as listed for class, unless otherwise specified.

- B. ALL PREMIUM CHECKS MUST BE CASHED WITHIN 30 DAYS AFTER DATE OF ISSUE. AFTER THAT POINT, ALL UNCASHED PREMIUMS WILL REVERT TO A SPECIAL 4-H SCHOLARSHIP FUND AS ESTABLISHED BY THE MANISTEE COUNTY AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.**
- C. Any exhibitor known to interfere with the awarding committee in the discharge of their duties shall forfeit all premiums. In case of inclement weather and/or unforeseen circumstances, it may be necessary to make a pro-rata payment on premiums if the fair receipts are not sufficient to apply in full. All entries will be mutually taken on the basis of this understanding.

**SECTION 6. GATE ADMISSION**

- A. All persons (except children) will be provided with tickets or stamped for admission. Passes will be issued as may be necessary.
- B. The gatekeeper is directed to admit no one who does not show a stamp or authorized ticket.
- C. Children through age 12 will be admitted free, except at the Grandstand
- D. General admission (13 and over) \$3.00 per day.
- E. Individual Season Pass ticket \$10.00.
- F. Parking in vicinity of South Gate - free.

**2009 HEALTH REQUIREMENTS  
FOR LIVESTOCK  
EXHIBITED IN MICHIGAN  
SUMMARY**

**REVISED January 2009  
(Replaces all previous editions)**

***The following is a summary of the health requirements for livestock exhibited in Michigan. The complete set of requirements can be obtained by downloading them from the Michigan Department of Agriculture website [www.michigan.gov/mda-exhibitinfo](http://www.michigan.gov/mda-exhibitinfo) or by contacting the fair/exposition staff or livestock entry office.***

*\*Livestock means those species of animals used for human food and fiber or those species of animals used for service to humans. Livestock includes but is not limited to cattle, sheep, new world camelids (llamas, alpacas, vicunas, and guanacos), goats, bison, captive cervidae, ratites (cassowaries, kiwis, ostriches, and emus), swine, equine, poultry, aquaculture, and rabbits. Livestock does not include dogs and cats.*

**GENERAL**

Exhibitors at state, county, and district fairs, along with other livestock exhibitions, expositions, and shows are required to comply with all statutory and regulatory provisions of the State of Michigan relating to animal health outlined in Act No. 466 of the Public Acts of 1988, as amended, and rules promulgated for the implementation and enforcement of the act.

1. A fair shall have an accredited veterinarian on call whenever there are animals on the premises during the fair. A fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority shall do all of the following as described herein:
  - a. Notify exhibitors of health tests and certificates required for importation and exhibition in this state.
  - b. Examine and approve required health certificates, reports, test charts, certificates, or other required documentation before displaying, exhibiting, or stabling the animals in the exhibition area or before commingling with other animals.
  - c. Notify exhibitors whether or not poultry vaccinated against Infectious Laryngotracheitis (ILT) are allowed in the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show.
  - d. Assure that all participating equine test negative for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA).
2. Livestock with clinical signs of infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease shall be removed from the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show or, by permission of the director, shall be isolated on the premises.

Livestock that have known exposure to, or that show clinical signs of, infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease as determined by a veterinarian shall not be displayed or housed at a fair, exhibition, exposition or show unless permission to do so is granted by the director. The fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority is responsible for ensuring that the livestock are removed from the premises.

3. A fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority may require additional testing or vaccination of animals before entry and during the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show.
4. A bird shall not be handled except by the exhibitor, attendant, fair veterinarian, director, or judge after the bird is placed in an exhibition coop.
- 5a. **Starting March 1, 2007, all cattle moving to a show, sale, or exhibition are required to have an official radio frequency identification device (RFID) ear tag.** Exhibitors may call the National Holstein Association at 1-800-952-5200 to order RFID tags at a cost of \$2.00 per tag.
- 5b. **All out-of-state cattle exhibited in Michigan shall be tagged with an official radio frequency identification device (RFID) ear tag.** Tags can be ordered by calling RJ Matthews Co. at 330-834-3000, or by calling the Indiana Animal Health, Inc. at 219-279-2378.
6. All goats, sheep, and privately-owned cervids shall bear official identification before they leave their home premises.
7. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to ensure that all requirements for testing, identification, and official interstate health certificate or official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection are fulfilled prior to importation and that proof of fulfilling these requirements is provided to the director, fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority upon request.
8. Upon request, a person who exhibits livestock shall present for inspection all reports, test charts, and appropriate health certificates required to accompany the livestock.
9. Out-of-state livestock for exhibition shall meet the requirements prescribed for importation of breeding animals of that species and shall be accompanied by a copy of an official interstate health certificate or an official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection issued by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin. Livestock shall not be diverted to a premises other than the destination site named on the official interstate health certificate.
10. Whenever an official test is conducted or an official vaccination is administered, livestock shall, unless exempted by the director, be permanently identified in a manner approved by the director.
11. Unless otherwise approved by the director, a facility for exhibition of livestock shall be constructed to allow sufficient separation of each exhibitor's livestock. The facility shall be constructed of a material that can be adequately cleaned and disinfected.

12. An exhibition building or yarding facility shall be cleaned and disinfected with an United States Department of Agriculture approved disinfectant used in accordance with label instructions before livestock are admitted by removing from the premises all manure, litter, hay, straw, and forage from pens, runways, and show rings and thoroughly disinfecting walls, partitions, floors, mangers, awarding facilities, and runways in a manner approved by the director. MDA is currently using Virkon S for field activities. For a complete list of disinfectants, please refer to [www.michigan.gov/mda-exhibitinfo](http://www.michigan.gov/mda-exhibitinfo).
13. Feed and water containers provided for exhibition coops shall be new or properly cleaned.
14. A feed or water container from which a bird has eaten or drunk shall be refilled in such a manner as to prevent contamination of the common supply of feed and water. A feed or water container may not be removed from an exhibition coop except for the purpose of cleaning.
15. An exhibition coop shall be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected before and after each exhibition.
16. Primary enclosures and stall areas shall be constructed and placed to provide adequate light for proper inspection for evidence of transmissible diseases.
17. Cage litter and bedding shall be clean and shall be replaced daily, or as often as needed.
18. A shipping crate used in the shipment of birds by common carrier may not be used as an exhibition coop. Shipping crates shall be cleaned and disinfected on the day of arrival after the birds have been removed for exhibition and before being used again. Unless otherwise necessary, shipping crates shall not be stored in the exhibition area.
19. Out-of-state livestock for exhibition shall meet the requirements prescribed for importation of breeding animals of that species and **shall be accompanied by an official interstate health certificate or an official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection** issued by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin.

Out-of-state livestock for exhibition shall meet the requirements prescribed for importation of breeding animals of that species and **shall be accompanied by an official interstate health certificate or an official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection** issued by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin. Livestock shall not be diverted to a premises other than the destination site named on the official interstate health certificate.

If vesicular stomatitis outbreaks have occurred in the state of origin within the past 30 days, the following statement must be included by the accredited veterinarian on any official interstate health certificate or official certificate of veterinary inspection for importation of equidae, cattle, sheep, goats, bison, New World camelids, swine, or privately owned cervidae into Michigan:

*"I have examined the animals listed on this certificate and have found no clinical signs of vesicular stomatitis. To the best of my knowledge, these animals have not been exposed to vesicular stomatitis within the previous 30 days, nor have they been vaccinated with vesicular stomatitis vaccine."*

All cattle, goats, and bison of any age and reproductive capability, unless transported directly to a USDA inspected slaughter facility, must be identified with a USDA approved official identification eartag, or official breed registration tattoo, prior to importation. An official breed registration tattoo may only be used if the animal is accompanied by the official breed registration certificate during the movement. The official identification must be recorded on the required official interstate health certificate or official certificate of veterinary inspection.

Dairy cattle, breeding cattle, feeder heifers, horses and other equidae, breeding swine, feeder swine, market hogs, llamas, alpacas, privately-owned cervids, aquaculture, and wild animals for exhibition originating outside the state of Michigan shall meet the requirements found at [www.michigan.gov/mda-exhibitinfo](http://www.michigan.gov/mda-exhibitinfo) by contacting the fair/exposition staff or livestock entry office.

If a Gold Ribbon is given for a class not offered, that exhibit will not qualify for competition. It may be displayed, but not judged. ONLY ONE GOLD RIBBON PER CLASS WILL BE GIVEN.**

**The following rules apply to the County Fair Gold Ribbon program. The ribbon must have been won during the 2008/2009 fair seasons.**

1. **WHO QUALIFIES:** Gold Ribbons will be given to the **Best of Show** winners in a department/section/class. The Gold Ribbon entitles the recipient to enter the Gold Ribbon competition at the Michigan State Fair. Exhibitors must be Michigan residents. There is no entry fee for this competition.
2. **DEADLINES:** Winners of Gold Ribbons awarded after August 1, 2009 must compete at the State Fair next year (2010). Entry forms and mailed exhibits must be postmarked no later than August 1, 2010.
3. **ENTRY FORMS:** A W-9 form must be completed and included with each entry form. Entry forms with incomplete information will not be processed. More information, and all forms are available at: <[www.michigan.gov/mistatefair/](http://www.michigan.gov/mistatefair/)>
5. **MAILING INFORMATION:** Exhibits may be mailed pre-paid to the Michigan State Fair. **Enclose the entry form and W-9 form with your exhibit by August 1, 2010.** You may also hand deliver (call for delivery dates). Package each exhibitor separately. Include your Gold Ribbon with your exhibit and include your name on the back. Identify and label all parts of your exhibit and attach together with pins or string. Arrangements may be made to have the exhibit returned by U.P.S., but you must provide a suitable shipping container. Also include payment for return shipping or a prepaid UPS label, along with \$10.00 to cover the handling fee.
6. **DISPLAY INSTRUCTIONS:** For garments, a hanger will be provided or you may include a bust, mannequin, or special hanger if desired. Exhibits that require assembly are the responsibility of the exhibitor. All artwork must hard framed or matted with 4-ply, and be ready for hanging (hanging device may not be attached with tape). Glass in frames is not recommended. Maximum hanging size is 24" x 24." Larger artwork requires an easel.
8. **FAIR ENTRY:** Each exhibitor will be mailed two free gate passes to the 2010 Michigan State Fair, once the entry form has been processed. Winners will also be invited to attend the County Fair Day Luncheon.
